Bremont ISD has the right to be more stringent on these recommendation based on health and safety of the school campus.

Bremont ISD provides traditional, in-person instruction to all students PK-12. For families that do not want their child(ren) to attend in-person instruction, alternatives can be found on the school website. In the event that we have confirmed cases of COVID-19, those that are affected will be required to return to remote instruction for the period of quarantine. During those instances, students and parents will be assisted to ensure appropriate educational resources are provided for the continuous success of all students.

TRADITIONAL IN-PERSON SCHOOL

- Face to face instructional setting with new health protocols in place

VIRTUAL SCHOOL assigned to students affected by COVID-19 or quarantine requirements only.

- Asynchronous instruction that does not require having the instructor and student engaged at the same time.
- The student is required to be engaged daily with work and the teacher is required to give feedback.
- Students are expected to be actively engaged in learning for a **minimum of 3 hours per day** for grades PK-5.
- Students are expected to be actively engaged in learning for a **minimum of 4 hours per day** for grades 6-12.
- Coursework will have the same expectations as in-class learning.

Virtual instruction in the 2020-2021 school year in Bremond ISD will look vastly different from virtual instruction during the 2020 Spring semester closure. Students should have access to working internet. A chromebook will be provided if needed.

A student will be considered absent from virtual school if the student does not have documented engagement with the Learning Management System (Google Classroom) and/or daily contact with the teacher, and/or documentation of completion/turn in of daily assignments. Students not meeting the 90% attendance rule will be subject to truancy laws.

VISITORS	Visits to the campus will be restricted to only those essential to school operations. Parents have to pick up students curbside. Call 254-746-7145 for tardy or early release of students.
DELIVERIES	No deliveries allowed (homework, backpack, lunches, instruments, birthday treats, etc.), unless it is related to health or hygiene issues. Call 254-746-7145 for assistance.

<p>FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS</p>	<p>Q: How do I know if my student is a close contact? A: Parents/Guardians will be notified by the school nurse or school administration if their student is considered close contact.</p> <p>Q: What is close contact? A: Being directly exposed to infectious secretions (e.g., being coughed on); or being within 6 feet for a total of approximately 15 minutes throughout the course of a day; however, additional factors like case/contact masking (i.e., both the infectious individual and the potential close contact have been consistently and properly masked), ventilation, presence of dividers, and case symptomology may affect this determination.</p> <p>Q: How will content be delivered in Virtual School if my student is a close contact or becomes infectious? A: - Students in Virtual School will have opportunities to watch recorded instructional lessons with the teacher via the computer or other electronic device. There will also be learning activities to complete each day. Lessons will consist of direct instruction as well as a combination of guided practice, independent work, collaborative group work, and formative assessments. Lessons could include video clips with guiding questions, graphic organizers, time to share, checks for understanding, and reflection opportunities. Students are expected to engage daily and participate in each class following a daily schedule. Students will use Google Classroom to access their instructional material.</p> <p>Q: What curriculum will be taught in Virtual School? A: The curriculum in both Virtual School and Traditional In-Person will be the same. The curriculum is based on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS).</p> <p>Q: Will my child have to take the STAAR (State assessment) if he/she is in Virtual School? A: Yes. According to the Texas Education Agency, there is currently no plan to eliminate any standardized testing regardless of whether students participate online or in person.</p>



Q: Will my child be expected to attend remote/online classes everyday? What is the attendance requirement?

A: Students in both programs are subject to compulsory attendance laws. All students enrolled in remote/online instruction must check-in and engage in learning activities in all classes daily. Students must be in attendance for at least 90 percent of the time the course is offered in order to receive credit or a final grade. Failure to check in and engage in learning daily could result in truancy charged for not meeting the 90% compulsory attendance law.

Q: What are the technology requirements for Virtual School?

A: Students will need internet access and a laptop, tablet, or similar device capable of connecting to the internet.

Q: What if I want to do Virtual School but do not have access to technology and/or internet?

Q: My child receives services through special education. Will these services continue in for Virtual School?

A: Special education instruction and/or related services will be provided in accordance with the ARD/IEP. Campuses will work with individual parents to ensure student needs are met virtually or in person.

Q: Will my child receive services from dyslexia in Virtual School?

A: Yes. Teachers trained in the dyslexia program will provide remote/online Instruction to identified students.

Q: My child receives services through the gifted and talented program. Will these services continue in remote/online Instruction?

A: GT students will be served virtually by the GT teacher through extensions and enrichment.

Q: What counseling support is available with remote/online Instruction?

A: Our BISD school counselor will assist students and/or families with any concerns virtually.

Q: What is BISD's recommendation for parents/guardians regarding transportation choices?

A: Parents/Guardians are encouraged to consider driving their children to and from school as possible for the extent of the COVID-19 outbreak. Campuses are working to maximize the flow of car lines while at the same time ensuring safety of all. Additionally, when available carpooling, walking, and bicycle riding are also encouraged.

Q: How do we register for school this year?

A: The first step in registration is to complete the Online registration forms which you can find on the Bremond ISD Website. Find Parent Portal under Quicklinks. After you have submitted the forms, you can contact the campus for a registration appointment (for new students only). You will need to bring proof of residency, birth certificate, social security card, identification for parent and your immunization record to your registration appointment. Texas is going to require immunization records for both in-person and virtual students. If you are not able to complete the form in advance, please notify the registrar when you make the appointment so they allow time to assist you with completing the form. Masks will be required when you come for registration. Please limit the number of people coming to registration as much as possible.



Q: What precautions are going to be put in place to reduce possible exposure to COVID-19?

A: There are many mitigation strategies we are implementing to reduce the possible spread of COVID-19 in our schools. These include daily employee/ student pre-screenings, enhanced routine cleaning and disinfecting, physical distancing in classrooms and common areas, frequent hand hygiene by students and staff, and many others.

Q: Will students' temperatures be checked?

A: Temperature checks of asymptomatic students at school is not recommended. All parents are asked to monitor their student(s) for signs and symptoms of COVID including taking their temperature and keep their student(s) home who have symptoms and/or a temperature of 100.0°F or greater.

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
